Textbooks: Please order the specified (or later) edition of Bradley's *Arnold*, since there are millions of editions, with some variance in page numbers and section numbers. This will ensure we're all on the same page (literally)!

- Required: *Bradley's Arnold Latin Prose Composition*, reprinted 2011 (revised 2005), available in paperback and ebook versions from Bolchazy-Carducci. ISBN 978-0-86516-595-3.
- Recommended: *Allen and Greenough New Latin Grammar* (updated by Anne Mahoney), 2001, paperback, Focus Publishing. ISBN 978-1585100279. An older version is available for free on the Perseus website.

Course content: We will cover several chapters of Bradley's per week. Each student's weekly assignment will consist of two parts: 1) translating some sentences, and 2) doing randomly assigned 'peer reviews' of other students' translations. Students will post translations and peer reviews on the week's discussion board in Canvas.

Posting procedure and deadlines:

- Post translations by **Thursday midnight (EST)**. Mark any problems/questions in **red**. Optional - give Bradley's Arnold (BA) or Allen-Greenough (AG) section numbers as grammatical references, where there is some question about how to proceed.
- After the Thursday midnight deadline, translations will be randomly assigned to students for peer review. If you make a correction (beyond simple things like number and case), cite the supporting BA or AG section number. Mark any problems/questions in **red**. Please post peer reviews by **Saturday midnight (EST)**, so that I have time to review them before class on Monday night.
- For both translations and peer reviews, mark any problems/questions in **red**, so that we can focus on those in that week's class discussion. We won't have time to cover all the assigned exercises in class.
- The final project will be your choice of an English-to-Latin translation; either one of the extended 'Passages for Translation' in the back of BA, or an English translation of your choice, of comparable length. (Avoid works that have already been translated into Latin, such as the Harry Potter books.) All translations should be your original work. Translations should include some of the more advanced constructions, such as indirect statement/question, relative clauses, conditions (or combinations thereof). All composers should see the 'Preliminary Hints' section in BA. The final class will be devoted to one-on-one writing conferences.
