Course Objectives

In this course, students will be introduced to the Latin language. The course will cover chapters 1-14 of *Wheelock's Latin*. This book, which is famous for the clarity of its conversational approach, emphasizes memorization of vocabulary, paradigms, and principal parts of verbs. Henceforth, this first semester of a three-semester sequence will seek to instill in students attention to grammar as they learn the language.
