Course Objectives: This is the second course of a three part beginning series at the University of Florida. Students will master the vocabulary, morphology, and syntax in chapters 15-27 of *Wheelock's Latin*, and practice in the fluid translation of Latin to English and English to Latin. Students will leave this class prepared for Latin 3.

Activities: Written exercises both in class and assigned as homework will reinforce the inflectional patterns of Latin and aid in memorization. Students will have regular practice reading Latin, translating into English, and composing Latin sentences. Oral drill and recitation will establish proper pronunciation. Quizzes and exams will ensure that students memorize vocabulary, declensions, and conjugations, and that they understand how to put these elements together in smooth translation.

Attendance and Participation: Students are expected to attend class every day and participate when called upon. Students are allowed two unexcused absences before points are deducted. Occasionally not being able to answer homework or syntax questions, because of difficulties, will not harm this grade. Although, excessive failure to participate in class will result in deductions.

Homework: Daily homework assignments are listed on the schedule, although assignments are subject to change at the instructor's discretion. Students must write out a translation of the assigned sentences/stories and bring them to class. On translation assignments, students are expected to write out both the Latin sentence and their own English translation, while showing their work (parsing, circling words, etc.). Homework will periodically be collected and graded.

Quizzes: Daily low intensity quizzes will be given. Each student's three lowest scoring quizzes will be dropped. These quizzes will only take a few minutes and will be administered either at the start or end of class.

Tests: Two tests and one final exam will be given, the dates of which can be found in the schedule. After a test is returned the student has the option to, within a week, correct their test and bring it to me during my office hours. After a discussion of their mistakes and corrections, the student will receive an extra 10% on their test. This option is **not** available for the final.

Please Note: While tests will focus on the material covered since the last one, tests will also include material from Latin one and chapters previously covered in Latin two.
