Course Description & Student Learning Objectives:

The purpose of this course is to read select works from Roman literature while exploring issues of immigration and exile in ancient and modern times. What can the Romans teach us about immigration? Why do modern day immigrants turn to Rome and Greco-Roman myths when writing about immigration? How does the Roman view of the "Eternal City" contrast with the modern view of the "American Dream?"

Students will learn to:

- ✓ Compare the Romans' views on immigration with modern views on immigration
- ✓ Critically evaluate the relationship between Greco-Roman myth and modern immigration stories
- ✓ Investigate the consequences of exile in ancient and modern times

Course Policies:

Students with a valid excuse have **one week** after a missed assignment (or one week after recovering from an illness) to hand in the work.

Course Grading: Your final grade will be based on how well you do on 8 out of 10 quizzes, each of which will be worth 8% of your final grade. You will also be required to create an "American Dream" powerpoint, worth 10% of your grade, plus a final project (also worth 10%). In addition, during the course of the semester you will be given two opportunities to participate in an extra credit "minute paper" where you will write an answer to a question based on the day's lecture and each essay you complete will have the ability to raise your final grade one full point. You must be present to participate and hand in your essay at the end of the class period. Regular attendance and active participation in class discussion is expected. You should therefore plan to be present every week and be prepared to discuss the assigned readings. It is extremely difficult to be involved in the learning process unless you participate fully in class activities. Thus, your participation in class discussion is especially critical. You cannot make an effective contribution to the class if you come to class unprepared, are chronically late, or fail to attend class.
