Course objectives and goals

This course offers a comprehensive survey of classical mythology. We will explore the rich heritage of legends, myths and tales through which the Greeks and the Romans tried to explain the natural phenomena, the religious believes and the history of the world around them. We will read stories about Greek gods, heroes and monsters, with their interpretations in ancient literature and arts and their influence on the culture of our times. All the texts will be read in English translation.

Your grades will be based, first of all, on two exams (midterm and final). In addition, 10 **unannounced** quizzes will be administered during the course (you may drop your lowest quiz).

- 10 quizzes = 25%
- Final exam (Apr. 28) = 40 %
