


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

 - 2. (map of Alexander's conquests).




3. (map of the Hellenistic World).

Lines 6-8 αἰ μὴ εἴη δαμοσία ὀδός, δι' ἀλλότριον κορίον νέκυν ... "If there is not a public road through someone else's land ...

9. Inscription from Lissos (*IC* 2.17.1), lines 9-14:

τὸν αὐτὸν φίλον κἠχθρὸν ἑξεν καὶ εἴ τίς κα ἐ[πὶ] τὰν Μάγα ἐπαρχείαν ἐπιστρ[α]τεύει βοαθησεν τὸς Ὀρείος, κ[α]τὰ τὰ αὐτὰ δὲ καὶ εἴ τίς κα ἐπὶ τ[ὰ]ν Ὀρείαν ἐπιστρατεύει βοαθ[η]σεμ Μάγαν. ὅρκος that they would have the same friend and enemy, and if anyone should invade Magas's territory, the Oreii would send aid, and in the same way also if someone should invade the (land) of the Oreii, Magas would send aid.

- 10. Polybius 24.3.1: This year [sc. 181] witnessed the beginning of great troubles in Crete, if indeed one can talk of a beginning of trouble in Crete. For owing to the constant succession of their civil wars and their excessive cruelty to each other, beginning and end mean the same thing in Crete, and what is regarded by some as a paradoxical utterance is there constantly a matter of fact.
