Course content:

This course will feature both translations from the original Latin text, and secondary readings. The weekly homework will feature a translation assignment, and sometimes a reading assignment. The weekly homework document (translation + questions/comments on reading assignment) is due on the SUNDAY before the class in which it will be discussed. Students will be asked to translate in class, and participate in discussions about the readings or associated topics.

Students will also acquaint themselves with contemporary research on Lucretius through a book or article report, in preparation for their final project, a short research paper on a Lucretius-related topic of their choice.

Homework posting procedure and deadline:

- Post the homework for each Tuesday's class in the appropriate Canvas assignment by Sunday midnight (EST). Upload your work in a Word document.
- Be prepared to discuss your translation and the secondary readings in class on Tuesday. You may refer to your notes in class.

Course grade will be based on the following:

- Class attendance: 20% (Please notify me in advance if you have a conflict.)
- Class homework and participation: 35%
 - To maximize your points for class participation each week, you can do the following: volunteer for translating; ask questions and offer responses about the Latin text and the secondary readings; offer helpful comments and suggestions during the class, using either the microphone/webcam or the chat board.
- Article/book review: 20%
 - o 'claim' an item for review: 5% (due in Canvas by midnight, March 9)
 - o review and class presentation: 15% (due in class March 30)
 - The review should be between 600 and 900 words. Follow the guidelines in the Style sheet for book reviews in the *Classical Journal* (included in the Canvas Modules for March 9 and March 30).
- Short paper: 25%

- rough draft (minimum: thesis statement, outline, starting bibliography): 5% (due by midnight, April 13). This will form the basis for your individual writing meeting on the last day of classes, April 20.
- finished paper: 20% (5-7 pages, 1.5 spacing, 12 point Times New Roman font, exclusive of bibliography, title page, and abstract. Use APA format:
