# **COURSE DESCRIPTION & OBJECTIVES**

This is the **third** course of a three part beginning series at the University of Florida. Students will concurrently (1) review Latin I & II, (2) master vocabulary, morphology, and syntax in chapters **28-40** of Wheelock's Latin, and (3) practice in the fluid translation of Latin to English and English to Latin. More specifically, students will continue learning the inflectional patterns of Latin, and will be able to recognize different forms of declensions and conjugations. They will concurrently improve their Latin vocabulary, grammar, and syntax skills, while exploring Latin mythology and culture expressed through the original literature. Students will be asked to practice daily and eventually master their ability to translate from one language into the other. Thus, they will significantly improve the awareness of both languages, English and Latin, in their respective elements of vocabulary, morphology, and syntax. Students will also read **selections of prose and poetry in the original Latin**. Students will leave this class prepared to succeed in 2000-level translation classes.

# ACTIVITIES

The objectives mentioned above will be accomplished through:

- 1. Written exercises both in class and assigned as homework (purpose: these exercises will reinforce the language acquisition and will help the students memorize easier both the vocabulary and the inflectional patterns of Latin)
- 2. Regular reading Latin practice, translating into English, and composing Latin sentences (purpose: this kind of activities will improve the students' awareness of both languages, while they will be becoming acquainted with the mechanisms of the Latin language)
- 3. Oral drill and recitation (purpose: this kind of activities will establish a proper pronunciation)
- 4. Quizzes and exams (purpose: this kind of activities will allow the students to check themselves and ensure that they have memorized vocabulary, declensions, and conjugations, and that they understand how to put these elements together in smooth translation)

### ✓ All students are expected to complete 100% of classrooms activities, whether absent or not.

✓ Assignments and quizzes will be also accounted for online. If a student misses a quiz or homework he or she will be expected to make it up, with no exceptions. ✓ Students are also expected to check Canvas and email regularly, and to respond, when needed, within a reasonable time.
