Course Description & Student Learning Objectives:

The purpose of this course is to read select passages from Vergil's *Aeneid* while exploring the history, culture and art of Augustan Rome. Emphasis will be on learning Latin grammar, vocabulary and syntax.

Students will learn to:

- ✓ Gain an appreciation for the influence of the Aeneid on modern popular culture
- ✓ Define the genre of epic poetry
- ✓ Improve knowledge of Latin grammar and syntax; improve translation skills; increase Latin vocabulary
- ✓ Increase knowledge of scansion of Latin poetry

Required text:

Vergil's Aeneid (edited by Clyde Pharr) A good dictionary and Latin grammar are also recommended.

Student Expectations and Attendance Policy:

<u>Course Grading</u>: Your final grade will be based on how well you do on three equally weighted exams which will each be worth 20% of your final grade. In addition, you will also be asked to complete one in-class presentation worth 20% total. Regular attendance and active participation in class discussion is expected (20%). You should therefore plan to be present every week and be prepared to discuss the assigned readings. It is extremely difficult to be involved in the learning process unless you participate fully in class activities. Thus, your participation in class discussion is especially critical. You cannot make an effective contribution to the class if you come to class unprepared, are chronically late, or fail to attend class.
