COURSE OBJECTIVES

To gain an appreciation of the unique facets of Roman religion through both a topical and historical approach, using both primary and secondary sources.

TEXTBOOKS

<u>REQUIRED</u>: *Religions of Rome, Vol. I A History*, and *Vol. II, A Sourcebook*. M. Beard, J. North, and S. Price, Cambridge University Press, 2007. Note: Vol. I is organized chronologically, Vol. II by subject matter.

<u>ALSO</u>: We'll be translating excerpts from Cicero's *De Natura Deorum* Book I, but I will provide pdf's of the text and commentary.
