COURSE OBJECTIVES

This is the FIRST course of a three part beginning series at the University of Florida. Students will master the vocabulary, morphology, and syntax in chapters 1-14 of Wheelock's Latin, and practice in the fluid translation of Latin to English and English to Latin. Students will leave this class prepared to succeed in Latin 2.

ACTIVITIES

Written exercises both in class and assigned as homework will reinforce the inflectional patterns of Latin and aid in memorization. Students will have regular practice reading Latin, translating into English, and composing Latin sentences. Oral drill and recitation will establish proper pronunciation. Quizzes and exams will ensure that students memorize vocabulary, declensions, and conjugations, and that they understand how to put these elements together in smooth translation.
