COURSE DESCRIPTION: Readings in Vergil's *Aeneid, Eclogues* or *Georgics,* with emphasis on introducing Vergilian style, diction, poetic techniques and basic genre differences. Review of Latin grammar and syntax. (H)

PREREQUISITE KNOWLEDGE AND SKILLS: LAT 1104 or LAT 1131 or two years of high school Latin.

COURSE GOALS AND/OR OBJECTIVES:

- 1. Learn to critically evaluate original and unique aspects of Roman epic literature
- 2. Assess thematic connections between ancient Roman culture and modern culture
- 3. Identify key constructions from Latin grammar and syntax and gain knowledge of essential vocabulary, along with improving your translation and scansion skills

HOW THIS COURSE RELATES TO THE STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES IN CLASSICS:

A. Humanities Component

Humanities (H)

Humanities courses provide instruction in the history, key themes, principles, terminology, and theory or methodologies used within a humanities discipline or the humanities in general. Students will learn to identify and to analyze the key elements, biases and influences that shape thought. These courses emphasize clear and effective analysis and approach issues and problems from multiple perspectives.

<u>Close reading</u>: The students will read selections from Vergil's *Aeneid* in Latin. They will gain a solid understanding of the genre of epic and its key elements. Along with learning more about Latin grammar and syntax, they will analyze the influence of Vergil on modern literature and popular media.

<u>Critical thinking</u>: The students will also engage with secondary texts and media that analyze the primary text. This will encourage them to understand their own experiences with modern popular media that ancient Roman literature has influenced.

<u>Analytical writing (expression of ideas)</u>: All group projects will have a written component as well as the final presentation each student will complete. Students will be required to engage with the assigned sources in a way that demonstrates their capability to understand complex problems from multiple perspectives.

<u>Communication</u>: All class meetings have a built-in discussion component. Students will be required to present their work on an assigned topic and explain their conclusions.

INSTRUCTIONAL METHODS: This is a synchronous course that meets MWF 6th period in Zoom. The course contains 15 content modules. You have one week per module to complete assigned work. Each week, you will have assignments, such as translating the Latin text. Sometimes you will also watch short videos or read blogposts or articles that contain course-related content in preparation for class.

COURSE POLICIES:

ATTENDANCE POLICY: Daily attendance will be taken. Students are expected to arrive at class on time and have prepared the homework. Each student is allowed three unexcused absences. After that, there will be a 5 point deduction from your class attendance grade each time you are late to class, arrive unprepared, or are absent.
