## **Course Description and Objectives**

This is the first of a three-semester sequence for students with little or no background in Latin at the University of Florida. Students will concurrently (1) cover basics of Latin vocabulary, grammar and syntax in **chapters 1-14** of Wheelock's *Latin*, and (2) practice in the fluid translation of Latin to English.

### **Daily Activities**

Written exercises both in class and assigned as homework will reinforce the inflectional patterns of Latin and aid in memorization. Students will have regular practice reading, analyzing structure, and translating Latin into English. Quizzes and exams will ensure that students memorize vocabulary, declensions, and conjugations, and that they understand how to put these elements together in smooth translation.
